"GET TO KNOW YOUR STARS"

Growing up (do military aviators ever really "grow up?") on the rural southern edge of The Bluegrass in the '50's and 60's, as with every red bloodied American adolescent male, I was enthralled with the coolness and freedom provided by the automobile. I believe every male kid from my generation has a "Corvette story". The Marque that was Mercedes Benz wasn't even on our radar.

I drove a C-1 Corvette during Army Flight School. Years and a number of different addresses stateside and abroad found me back in a string of Corvettes. Still no MB? I'm getting there!

In 1998, I'd sold my two remaining C-4's and was still awaiting the National Corvette Museum delivery of my new C-5 and needed something to drive during the wait. Something lead me to a used car dealership dealing in Mercedes, BMW's, and the occasional exotic where I found a really nice 1986 190E 2.6 liter. I bought it as a "driver" car awaiting my plastic Chevy. My new used 190E just kept on impressing the car guy in me to the point that, still awaiting "the delivery," I traded for an even nicer 1993 300E. Did I mention that the MB seed had now been firmly planted? After taking delivery of my new C-5 and having a really nice 300E as an alternate "daily driver," the 500E bug started. My used car dealer, turned friend, happened to have a couple of 500E's on his lot and, yep, my 300E became a really low mileage 500E.

About this time, Anne needed a reliable vehicle for her new commuter job with the USDOJ, and we liked the looks of the first generation ML 320. At that point we were unknowingly a firmly entrenched Mercedes-Benz family, and, in 2005, I decided to join MBCA.ORG. I liked her ML so much I bought it while she drove a new Mercedes C320 when she moved to more civilized terrain in Columbia, South Carolina. Back home in San Antonio, I added a 2005 CLK 320 to "the fleet."

I'm now down to the 500E, the ML320, the afore mentioned 2005 CLK320, and my C-5 along with Anne's C320.

By the time we moved to Louisville in 2007, I was down to "only" two cars: the 500E and C-5. I found myself a 2003(IRC) E320 shooting brake, aka "station/sport wagon" in Indiana. Everything I had read in "The Star" and other publications was true. It handled like an "E" Class sedan with as much or more room than an ML SUV and AWD.

Sometime around 2010, I found a newer E 350 CPO "shooting brake" (pretentious, aren't I?) better color, IMHO, (silver and black interior) and the larger V-6 (350 vs 320). The ML 350 was rearended about this time, and thus was our first experience with accidents and Mercedes; kudos to the vaunted Mercedes safety rating.

We traded the 2007 ML350 for a new 2017 GLE350 in the summer of 2017, and that has been our "go to" for trips to Texas, shopping hauls, and just about everything else.

By now we were attending more events with the Bluegrass Stars Chapter, meeting new friends and enjoying the events.

Our last addition to the fleet was a snazzy little 2013 M350 Cabriolet, and we loved it, even if we were back to three cars with a two car garage! We were getting more and more involved with the Stars; the friendship of like-minded enthusiasts has been cemented due to our appreciation of the Mercedes automobile!

And me? I'm still enthralled with the coolness and freedom provided by the automobile. Only now, that automobile is the true marque of the industry – the Mercedes-Benz.
