Our last pre-lockdown BC Stars drive would take four of our Members' cars on a short Sea to Sky Highway jaunt, to Porteau Cove.



May 1st. and May 9th., the darkest days of Lockdown, and an uncertain journey. As we fought to keep up our own morale, we also paid tribute to the masked and gowned doctors and nurses, on the front lines of the pandemic. Tribute was paid in every neighbourhood with nightly 7pm pot-banging of support. It was as much to honour the medical staff, as it was to make us feel that we were doing something for the cause.

One group of car enthusiasts sought to harness the pent up energy of car owners, to show support in their own way. The organizers of "Cars 4 Covid", gathered cars and drivers together at Lougheed Mall. For a \$5 donation, they would sell you a bright green Covid windshield sticker. The money went towards support for medical personnel.

May 1st., we had about 50 cars in a convoy to Burnaby General Hospital. At 7pm we drove through the hospital parking lot, waving, and horns blowing.

The following weekend, May 9th, it is thought that over 200 cars gathered for a convoy to Surrey Memorial Hospital. How it had grown! Surrey RCMP assisted us to stage the cars in parking lots by the hospital. We circled the buildings, with groups of the staff waving back at us and videoing the parade of cars.

This enthusiastic event was a great boost for many doing their best to carry on through those days.

German Car Festival 2019

[With the cancellation of the 2020 German Car Festival due to COVID-19, we are reproducing this report of the 2019 edition - Ed.]

The 18th German Car Festival for charity, was a huge success. On a bright sunny day, North Vancouver's Waterfront Park filled up with 210 Audi's, BMW's, Porsche's and Mercedes. Participants were fighting to get past the gate even before the 9:00 am opening time.

This year, BMW's Rod Meares had a lot more help from the other Clubs. We worked more closely with our beneficiary, the North Shore Harvest Project, to find out what was needed most. Audi's Maxim Gotsutsov created GCF Social media accounts to get the word out to as many people as possible before the date.

Mercedes had a large number of eager attendees, with 90% of the cars on the field by 9:30! Many came from out of town. Emmanuel Athans drove up from Seattle again with Rik Johnson, in a tastefully modified, W140 CL500. The local, Benzcouver Group, put in a good showing with some real beauties, also. Hardy Suelzer treated us to a look at his AMG GT-C, and there were a number of brightly coloured R107 SL's.

Rod Meares and Club Representatives will be making a public cheque presentation to the Harvest project before the end of August. Thank you, to all those prize donors, volunteers, organizers and participants who made this all possible.

Since the event's inception in 2002, the admission charge had always been \$10 per car. The contributions of our donors and sponsors were consistent, as were the efforts of our volunteers. Each year however, the purchasing power of the funds slowly eroded, as prices of commodities rose. After 18 years, the gate fee was finally upped to \$20 per car. We still had a tremendous turnout, thanks to the generous nature of our participants. A net amount of \$4,465, perhaps the most ever, was raised in cash, and a record amount of groceries was donated.





Every year the German Car Festival makes a donation to the North Shore Harvest Project. Charities are more in need than ever during this time of COVID-19. Please consider that although the German Car Festival has been cancelled for 2020, charities such as the Harvest Project still require support.




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
